2017 Targeted Research Internal Seed Program (TRISP)

Important Reminder & Deadline Extension Announcement

APPLICATION DEADLINE HAS BEEN EXTENDED TO WEDNESDAY, MARCH 15

Serving as a catalyst for UNC Charlotte faculty, TRISP offers internal funds intended to (1) help generate more compelling grant submissions to federal agencies, (2) initiate new intellectual directions for our faculty, and (3) foster new relationships across colleges, departments or centers. Key considerations include the likelihood that the project can be leveraged to obtain new externally-funded research from mission oriented funding agencies such as DoD, DoE, DoT, DHS, etc. (typically not NSF or NIH), and whether the project cannot be otherwise initiated using regular department or college resources. In its inaugural competition, CRI made ten TRISP awards totaling nearly \$380,000 and the program is already generating exciting results. Detailed information and submittal guidelines for 2017 TRISP

EPIC Energy Seminar Series



Epic Energy Seminar Series: How UNC Charlotte is Advancing the Research, Practice and Policy of Coal Ash Management

Dr. John Daniels, Chair of the National Ash Management Advisory Board, and Professor and Chair in Absentia of the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering at UNC Charlotte, will discuss coal ash, a construction material and desirable product with a litany of useful applications, but also the nation's second largest "solid waste" stream, behind municipal garbage. Depending on the method and assumptions, future costs for managing coal ash vary by several orders of magnitude, with some estimates as high as \$20 billion for North Carolina and \$229 billion for the entire U.S. This presentation will review challenges and opportunities in coal ash management while also summarizing the unique portfolio of ash related activities and research thrusts at UNC Charlotte.
