Registration Guidelines - Summer and Fall 2019 Terms

The Fall 2019 Schedule of Classes is now available. The following information has been prepared to help you assist students with registration for Summer and Fall 2019 terms. Registration times have been scheduled from April 1-5. Open registration begins on April 8. See the [Registration Time Table](#) for more information.

Important Registration Dates:

Registration Override Types:

Override	Use of Override
AUTH	Overrides all registration restrictions except closed section or level restriction (<i>AUTH is strongly suggested in order to prevent over enrollment</i>).
PERMIT	Overrides all registration restrictions except time conflicts or level restriction. (Do NOT use on sections with a wait list).
DUP	Only overrides duplicate sections (topics courses).
TIME	Only overrides time conflicts.
CO-REQS	Only overrides co-requisites.

REPEAT	Only overrides repeated courses.

Additional Information:

- Undergraduate students cannot be registered or receive credit for graduate level courses without first being admitted as (1) a dually-enrolled post-baccalaureate student, or (2) an early-entry graduate student. Please check with the Graduate School before awarding registration overrides to this population of students. The Office of the Registrar runs weekly reports to monitor this issue.
- A student's registration time is based on their cumulative earned hours and do not take into account any hours in-progress. However, in-progress hours are used for prerequisite checking.

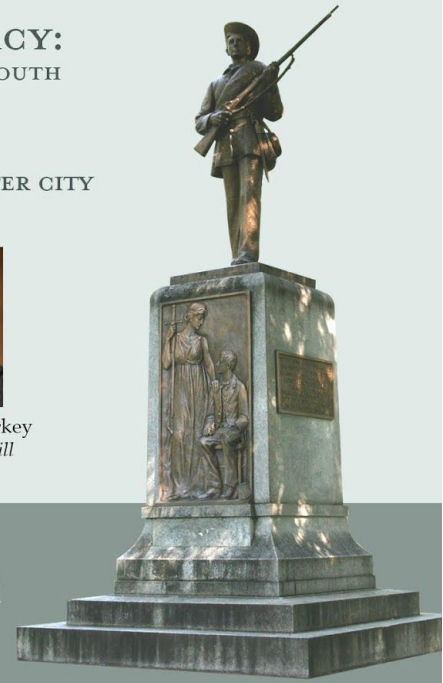
