### **Faculty Forum**

### Recognizing and Responding to Civil Rights Concerns

This training will be presented by the Office of Legal Affairs' newest attorney, Samantha Sears, who has extensive experience in handling and responding to civil rights complaints, both from an employer's perspective and from an enforcing agency's perspective. The session will have two components: (1) recognizing civil rights complaints (whether related to sex, race, religion, disability, or other protected status) even when the student or employee expressing concerns does not use the words "report" or "complaint" and (2) responding to civil rights complaints, which requires specific steps but will also vary depending on the situation. This session is designed to foster greater awareness among supervisors, such as department chairs and academic affairs administrators, regarding their responsibility to respond to civil rights concerns and to highlight existing university resources available to assist them in navigating the many challenges that often arise in these contexts.

### International Women's Day Film Screening and Discussion

Dr. Eylem Atakav is Senior Lecturer in Film and Television Studies at the University of East Anglia, United Kingdom, where she teaches courses on women, Islam media, and Middle Eastern media.
