UNC Charlotte United: A Remembrance Concert



Tickets are still available for **United: A Remembrance Concert** at the Belk Theater in the Blumenthal Performing Arts Center at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 30, 2020. Hosted by CBS correspondent and UNC Charlotte alumnus Don Dahler '91 with the Charlotte Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Christopher Warren-Green and featuring UNC Charlotte students, faculty, staff, and alumni, as well as an original composition written by one of our faculty members, John Allemeier. The composition will accompany an original video production that will both remember the victims but also the larger and united response of the greater Charlotte community. Unsatisfactory Grading Opens February 10

Unsatisfactory Grading opens Monday, February 10. Select one of the two indicators listed below for your course by February 28 at 12:00 p.m. Either option can be selected using My UNC Charlotte. Please refer to the midterm grading instructions for more information.

1. Unsatisfactory Progress: Web grading capability will be available to assign Unsatisfactory Progress grades for any students who are not performing at acceptable levels in your course. From the grade dropdown box, select the correct grade for the appropriate student. If you are unable to access your class list to assign unsatisfactory grades, please contact <u>Elise Mickey</u> in the Office of the Registrar. Please note that this process is only to solicit unsatisfactory progress, not a grade for all students.

If you have a student who has stopped attending or never attended class, award that student an unsatisfactory grade (F for undergraduate level and U for graduate level). This informs the student that he/she is currently enrolled in the class and runs the risk of an unsatisfactory final grade, provided proper procedures are not followed.

Report only students with unsatisfactory progress by using the following notations:

- Undergraduate students: record only D or F grades
- Graduate students: record only C or U grades

Last date of attendance: The last attended date is not required for midterm grades; however, it can be entered at midterm if the student has stopped attending/participating in classes. The last attendance date will move to the final grading page at the end of the term. It can be edited again at final grading if the student returns to the course. This provides an additional flag for advisors to intervene earlier in the term.

2. Courses with All Satisfactory Grades

Select 'All grades for course are satisfactory for this course. No grades to report.'

Dr. Ritika Prasad, associate professor, Department of History, will discuss Barbara Crossette's article from the Foreign Policy Association's <u>Great Decisions</u> 2020 Briefing Book, "India and Pakistan." The article describes how "India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi rode a wave of Hindu nationalism to a historic reelection in 2019. His first order of business was to revoke the special status granted to the Kashmir region, inflaming the rivalry between India and Pakistan. How will the Kashmir situation affect the region, both economically and politically?"
